Debrief: The Storm of 2022

Storm Kenan brought blizzard conditions, hurricane strength winds, snow and frigid windchills to Cape Cod. Were you prepared? It is easy to ignore weather warnings since forecasts are not always exact, but Kenan's forecast was right on target. Anticipating power outages and dangerous road conditions, the Barnstable County Regional Planning Committee opened three emergency shelters on Cape, including Nauset Regional High School. Over the course of the weekend, thirty people used Nauset either overnight or as a warming center. One German Shepherd and two cats also took advantage of the pet shelter staffed by EDOA's Lower Cape Animal Shelter Team (LCAST). This was in addition to the municipal and volunteer agencies that maintained the shelter over a 36-hour period.

Whether it is a winter storm or a hurricane, preparation starts at home. This is the first time in 7 years that Nauset High opened as an emergency shelter, but there have been close calls over those years. Coastal storms, whether in winter or summer, offer potential impact to Cape Cod because we extend sixty-five miles into the Atlantic Ocean.

You should always plan to shelter in place but doing so means

being prepared to stay safely in your home until the storm passes. The basic recommendation is to have supplies for three days: water, food, and medications for all family members and pets involved. Granted, sheltering-in-place is easier if you have a generator and town water since you will have access to power and water. Think about having easy to prepare foods, canned and bottled items, which are easy to store and have long shelf lives. Plan for one gallon of water per person per day with extra

for your pets. If your generator is gasoline operated, obtain the -Kathy Herrick, LCAST Coordinator gas in advance of the storm. Have cash on hand since power outages could impact ATM machines at your bank. Make sure you have batteries in the right sizes for flashlights and any lanterns. Charge your cell phones, vital equipment and any supplemental power sources before the storm hits.

> If conditions are such that sheltering in your home is not safe, pay attention to public service announcements from local officials indicating whether shelters or warming centers are opening. If you have to go to a shelter, remember to bring essentials with you. Learn more about storm preparation and emergency sheltering on these websites:
