Pet First Aid Course in Eastham

Basic dog first aid is an essential for any dog owner. The first moments that care is needed is the most important and the time to get to an emergency animal hospital is far longer - on weekends and holidays it can be an hour away.

EDOA is hosting another session with the wildly popular program by Tom Topham. Tom has trained emergency personnel, vet techs, and shelter personnel over many years, including a session for EDOA which got rave reviews.

The cost of the session is a reduced fee fo \$60. It will be held on October 15th at Chapel in the Pines, Samoset Rd. at 1 P.M. Sign–up in advance to limit the class to 8-10 participants.

Can tech find your Lost Dog?

Technology is doing some amazing things. It can find your lost phone, your way home, your luggage, and where to get the cheapest—well anything. So shouldn't it be able to find your dog?

Well, maybe.

You may have your dog "chipped". That will identify your dog as yours if found by someone with a scanner. But that does not help find your dog lost in the wilds of Eastham.

So, what about Apple's AirTags, GPS collars or Tile devices? Sure they work, but there are limitations. Tracey Plantier, president of EDOA has complied a comparison of the two most popular location devices.
